Owl Lodge brings a sense of refined luxury to garden living, where soaring ceilings and beautifully crafted oak beams become part of everyday life. Within its elegant three-bay frame, the heart of this annexe is a breathtaking double-height living space, the kind of room that makes guests pause as they step inside, eyes drawn upward to the magnificent oak structure overhead.

Floor-to-ceiling glazing wraps the corner, dissolving the boundary between inside and out. Whether you're curled up with the papers on a Sunday morning or hosting dinner around the table, the garden is always part of the scene. Upstairs, a private balcony becomes the perfect spot for that first cup of coffee, watching the day unfold across the landscape.

The feature fireplace anchors the living area – imagine the crackle of logs on autumn evenings, flames casting a warm glow across the oak frame.




Enjoy sitting by a log burner reading a book in your favourite chair.

Owl Lodge


Owl Lodge is a three-bay oak frame design with a vaulted double-height open-plan living space. With a clear span of 6.85 m and a ridge height of 6.2 m, it offers generous depth and volume, enhanced by face glazing, a first-floor balcony, feature fireplace, brick chimney and a catslide porch incorporating a ground-floor WC.



What George says: "The oak frame naturally divides the ground floor into three distinct zones through its post-and-beam sections. The left section efficiently accommodates both an ensuite bedroom and study, while the central bay houses the dramatic double-height living area where the kitchen flows into a dining and seating area. The accommodation comfortably sleeps four with a second bedroom upstairs. Upstairs, services are neatly concealed behind stud walls, maintaining clean lines throughout."
